

OVERVIEW

Paper 3 is the modern depth study, focusing on Germany after the end of WWI, the establishment of the new Weimar Republic, the Republic's ultimate demise alongside the rise to prominence of Hitler and his Nazi Party and the establishment of the Nazi state. The paper is divided into two sections and the question focus is primarily on source and interpretation work, with the expectation that students will be able to demonstrate an in-depth knowledge of this relatively brief period.

Paper 2 Section B focuses on the Cold War Period a substantial and coherent medium time span of at least 50 years and requires students to understand the unfolding narrative of substantial developments and issues associated with the Cold War.

Cold War Crises 1958-71

- Tension over Berlin – Problems in East Germany and the Berlin Wall 1961
- The Cuban Missile Crisis – Increased tension over Cuba and event of the Cuban Missile Crisis
- The Soviet Invasion of Czechoslovakia 1968

The End of the Cold War 1970-91

- Attempts to reduce tension between East and West – Détente, SALT 1, Helsinki Agreements, SALT 2, Gorbachev, summit conferences, the INF Treaty
- Flashpoints – Soviet Invasion 1979, Reagan and the Second World War
- The Collapse of Soviet Control of Eastern Europe – Gorbachev, Fall of the Berlin Wall, Collapse of the Soviet Union.
