Subject: History

Year 9

Y9 has been sequenced to allow students to understand diverse British and global studies. This focuses on the key themes of conflict OVERVIEW and diversity. In Year 9 we draw on the forgotten soldiers of the trenches, where we pause to consider why there is such a lack of evidence of black lives throughout all the periods they have studied. In unit 5 we explore civil rights in 20th century Britain including the roles of local grassroots activists campaigning for a fairer society in education, housing, health and in the workplace. In unit 6 we examine the consequences of Windrush and mass migration both at the time and retrospectively All Y9 units use case studies from Manchester and Salford so students can apply their learning to their local context.
