## Year Group: 11

In the final year of studying at SCA, Y11 students in Citizenship will complete the course by studying the final two modules. In the first of those modules, law and justice, students will gain knowledge and understanding of the law in the OVERVIEW UK and the bodies that exist to support and uphold the law such as courts and tribunals. Studying this particular module encourages students to develop their own critical thinking and to question the moral implications of offending behaviour. Students will need to recall and link information studied in the law and justice module within Y8, to provide them with a solid foundation platform to delve deeper into the content. Students in Y11 will then complete their final module within GCSE Citizenship, which is power and influence. Within this module, students will gain the knowledge and understanding of how the press and media can have an impact upon peoples beliefs and the role of world organisations associated with the UK such as the United Nations and NATO.
