In the final year of studying at SCA, Y11 students in Religious Studies will complete the course by studying the final three modules. In the first of those modules, students will study the faith of Islam, understanding and applying knowledge of Muslim beliefs and practices. Students will be required to call on their prior knowledge from the Islam topic they covered in Y8 and also the Islamophobia and Intolerance topic studied in Y9, as this knowledge will provide them with a solid foundation to build on. Moving into Term 2, Y11 students will begin to study the third of four ethical themes, crime and punishment. This topic also links to prior topics studied in Y9 such as capital punishment and provides cross curricular links with Citizenship, as law and justice is a module which all students study in Y8. Human rights and social justice is the final ethical theme that students in Y11 will study. This topic provides students with an enhanced understanding of respect and tolerance for all within our society and again has strong links to the Islamophobia and Intolerance module.
