planned to lay important foundational knowledge for future study and has a focus on local law and justice within the community. Firstly, this makes the content more relatable to the students and also encourages them to develop their own critical thinking and to question the moral implications of offending behaviour. The Spring term covers Careers Education Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG). This has been carefully selected to prepare students for their GCSE options choices shortly after, as it provides the students with the opportunity to identify their interests and hobbies. The common theme of 'relationships' is embedded throughout the PSHE/RSE topic studied in Term 3. Term 3 in Y8 encourages students to build on prior knowledge from studying healthy and un-healthy relationships in Y7 and how this links to topics such as consent, abuse and grooming.

Students studying Citizenship in Year 8 will begin studying the Law & Justice module, which has been deliberately

- 1- The history of crime and punishment in the UK
- 2- The UK's approach to criminals: Punitive Vs Restorative
- 3- Components of the British CJS and their effectiveness
- 4- Types of sentences and their effectiveness
- 5- Patterns of crime; locally and nationally
- 6- Youth justice

Topics covered within the Y8 careers, education, information, and guidance module:

- 1- Interests and skills
- 2- Different types of employment
- 3- Career market and pathways information
- 4- Progression routes; college and university
- 5- Progression routes; apprenticeships, traineeships, and workplace training
- 6- Soft skills (interview skills, confidence building)

Topics covered within the Y8 PSHE and RSE module:

- 1- Sexual consent and exploitation
- 2- Abuse and grooming
- 3- Forced and arranged marriages
- 4- FGM and Honour based violence

Students in Y8 will continue to be assessed using both formative and summative methods. The Academy wide 'Big Write' programme will assess students' knowledge and understanding and develop students' critical thinking skills. The 'Big Write' question that students will be asked is 'the criminal justice system is not fit for purpose' how far do you agree?

Assessment:

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Assessment in PSHE and RSE does not follow the usual trend of using the 'big write'. This is because these topics are much more of a matter of fact as opposed to peoples' opinions. As a result, we still ensure that both formative and summative methods of assessment are carried out, whereby students will have an overall 'knowledge checker quiz' to assess their holistic knowledge and understanding.
