



Length of Exam: 1 hour. Students will have to write a big idea and 3 PETE paragraphs (analytical paragraphs) on a character or theme from The Crucible.

Topic	Revision Content	Check
The Crucible Key Quotations	Test yourself weekly on the key quotations using your revision booklet.	
The Crucible Plot	Summarise the key plot events of the play from your revision guide onto flashcards. Don't just copy out sentences, summarise into your own words.	
The Crucible Characters	Summarise information about the key characters: John Proctor, Abigail Williams and Elizabeth Proctor. Make a mind map for each character summarising what they do and key quotations they say.	
The Crucible Key themes	Create mind maps on the key themes in The Crucible: reputation, corruption and power.	
The Crucible Practice essays	Practice essays on The Crucible using the following questions that are also in your revision booklet: 1) How is the character of Abigail Williams presented in The Crucible? 2) How is the character of John Proctor presented in The Crucible? 3) How is the character of Reverend Parris presented in The Crucible?

Length of Exam: 1 hour. Students will be asked to write a transactional piece of writing (a speech, article or letter) responding to a statement or question

Topic	Revision Content	Check
EPIIC structure for transactional writing	Remind yourself of the EPIIC structure that you can use to organize your transactional writing	
Letter	Using the EPIIC structure, practice writing a letter using the question prompt: <i>'Form groups should be mixed by year group to encourage better integration amongst the years.'</i> <u>Write a letter to your headteacher which addresses your beliefs.</u>	
speech	Using the EPIIC structure, practice writing a speech using the question prompt: <i>'The death penalty is the only way to deal with crime. Prison is a waste of money'</i> <u>Write a speech in which you express your views.</u>	
article	<i>'Young people are given too much homework. Students' timetables are becoming increasingly busier with tuition, interventions and after school clubs, it is important that young people are given more time for joy and relaxation when they are at home.'</i> <u>Write an article for your school magazine explaining your views on this issue.</u>	
Blog post	Using the EPIIC structure, practice writing a blog post using the question prompt: <i>'YouTube and TikTok are destroying the minds of teenagers. There should be a ban implemented.'</i> <u>Write a blog post that shows your views on the statement.</u>

You can choose to work on any topic by:


Typing one of the following in the Search for topics field:

Browsing the content by clicking on one of the main Strands:




STEP TWO: Choosing the right work

The difficulty level will be in line with that of your normal homework.

You can choose to complete questions that **introduce** the topic if you don't remember much about it, **strengthen** the topic if you need a recap or **deepen** the topic if you are looking to increase your knowledge.

An example of this is shown on the right with the topic of circles.

You will see the difficulty level is set to 5 (in the top right corner) but you can change this if you are finding questions too hard or too difficult.

Melody and Accompaniment: A tune with backing

Off-beat: Off the beat

Chord: Two or more notes played at the same time

Triad: Three notes played together as a chord

Inversion: The notes of a chord in a different order

Chord Changes: I, IV, V (1,4,5)

Band Instruments: Keyboard, Electric Guitar, Bass Guitar, Drums, Singer

Key terms:

Tied note: A note that is tied to another note of the same pitch.

Repeat sign: A symbol indicating that a section of music should be repeated.

An inversion: When you place the notes of a chord in a different order.

Time Signatures: how many beats in a bar. The top number tells you:

- 4 beats in a bar
- 3 beats in a bar
- 2 beats in a bar
- 1 beat silence

Band Skills:

Treble Clef: means it is higher pitched. Usually played with right hand.

Bass Clef: means it is lower pitched. Usually played with left hand.

Finger numbers on the piano / keyboard: Diagram showing finger numbers 1-5 for both left and right hands on a piano keyboard.

Notes on the stave: Diagram showing various musical notes on a five-line staff.

Structure:

The order of the sections of a song or piece:

In Popular Music we can use:

- Intro:** The introduction.
- Verse:** Words that describe a situation
- Pre-Chorus:** The part that leads into the Chorus
- Chorus:** The main part of the song
